Title Online Change Point Detection for Matrix-Valued Time Series

Version 0.1.2

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Description We provide two algorithms for monitoring change points with online matrix-valued time series, under the assumption of a two-way factor structure. The algorithms are based on different calculations of the second moment matrices. One is based on stacking the columns of matrix observations, while another is by a more delicate projected approach. A well-known fact is that, in the presence of a change point, a factor model can be rewritten as a model with a larger number of common factors. In turn, this entails that, in the presence of a change point, the number of spiked eigenvalues in the second moment matrix of the data increases. Based on this, we propose two families of procedures - one based on the fluctuations of partial sums, and one based on extreme value theory - to monitor whether the first non-spiked eigenvalue diverges after a point in time in the monitoring horizon, thereby indicating the presence of a change point. This package also provides some simple functions for detecting and removing outliers, imputing missing entries and testing moments. See more details in He et al. 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Description

A data matrix containing approximated critical values for the scaled Wiener process. A supplement to Table 1 in Horvath et al. (2004). The rows are for different gamma on a grid of 50 points in $[0,0.49)$ with step size equal to 0.01, while the columns are for different alpha on a grid of 50 points in $[0.001,0.5)$ with step size equal to 0.001. All the values are based on 100000 replications of simulated Wiener process on an equal grid of 20000 points in $[0,1]$, thus can be slightly different from those in Horvath et al. (2004).

For the partial-sum statistic with $\eta = 0.5$ or the worst-case statistic, the critical value is simply $-\log(-\log(1 - \alpha))$. For the partial-sum statistic with η not equal to 0.5, the critical value of the scaled Wiener process is approximated by simulated data or from our preserved table *cv.table*, covering η in [0.01, 0.49] with step size equal to 0.01 and α in [0.001, 0.500] with step size equal to 0.001. a scalar in $[0, 1]$, indicating the p-value of the test. The null hypothesis is that the k-th moment doesn't exist. Therefore, a small p-value indicates the existense of the k-th moment.
